Advanced Art Notes: DAIO—How to Write an Essay about a Work of Art

DESCRIBE:


- 1. Credit line information—(Title, artist, date, materials, size, museum and city)
- 2. CAPTURE: The description is a hook to grab a reader's attention. Think of a blind date and all the information that would intrigue you about a date—intrigue us about your artwork
- 3. Denotation—describe exactly what you see
 - What is in the background?(Farthest away from the viewer)
 - What is in the middle ground? (Middle depth)
 - What is in the foreground? (Closest to the viewer)

ANALYZE: Break down the artwork and figure out how the artist put it together

- 1. Elements of Design: Building blocks of art (line, shape, form, space, color, texture, color, value)
- 2. Principles of Design: How the elements are arranged in an artwork or put together (see notes from Chapter 8)

INTERPRET:

- 1. Connotation—state the meaning of the things you see using "text-based" evidence (the text here is what you see, not what you read.)
- 2. Story behind the artwork (can be based on time period or artist's background if you know about it, the title of the work, or just based on what you see.)
- 3. Why would the artist make this work?
- 4. Why would the artist choose this style to communicate with? Knowledge of art periods and "art-isms" is helpful, but you can also use general categories (see continuum line below.)



Realism: Artwork that represents objects and scenes as they are from life Abstraction: representing a scene with simplification, distortion, or exaggeration of reality. (Can range from a lesser degree to total abstraction or non-objective) Expressionism: Artwork that focuses on feelings or moods with colors, shapes, or abstraction

Formalism: Creating an artwork that focuses on the formal elements of art like line, shape, color

Non-Objective: No recognizable objects or subject matter

OPINION/EVALUATION:

- 1. Do you like the work? How do you feel about the artwork? Explain.
- 2. Is the work successful? Talk about the quality and the lasting importance of it. Do you think it can communicate in different times and places as a finished work of art? Explain.
